The State Revenue Office is holding free webinars to help you understand whether the Short Stay Levy applies to you, and what you may need to do. From 1 January 2025, the short stay

levy applies to short stays in Victorian property if you accept bookings for a stay in Victorian accommodation that is less than 28 consecutive days and charge a fee for the stay.

If you collect booking fees less than \$75,000 per year, you must lodge and pay annually – and the due date for the first return is 30 January 2026.



Farm Drought Support Grants

The Victorian Government is providing practical support to farmers impacted by drought.

The Farm Drought Support Grants (formerly On-Farm Drought Infrastructure Grants) program is available to assist primary production businesses to implement on-farm infrastructure improvements and undertake essential business activities that improve drought.

Eligible farmers will receive up to \$5,000 (ex-GST) as a co-contribution grant that will support activities including water infrastructure upgrades (such as pipes, tanks, troughs and dams), stock containment areas, and grain and fodder storage.

One-on-one farm advisory service

All farmers, anywhere in Victoria, can register for a free consultation with a farm management specialist.

The advisory service offers a session of up to 3 hours (face-to-face or online) and a follow-up call, to help farmers take stock and develop a plan for managing drought conditions.

The advice is suited to your situation, from a consultant that you nominate from the registered panel.

Agronomists, livestock nutritionists, veterinarians, pasture and grazing specialists and farm business advisors, can support you with:

- feed and water budgeting
- farm safety and workload management
- farm business and financial management
- soil health and pasture re-establishment
- animal health and welfare, and more.

Rural Financial Counselling Service (RFCS) Wellbeing Officers (statewide)

The RFCS offers free, confidential wellbeing support alongside their usual financial and small business counselling support.

Wellbeing counsellors can visit farmers at their property or talk over the phone to assist with mental health and wellbeing issues farmers and their families with three new positions funded in the Southwest.

RIC Loans

RIC variable interest rate for farm business loans is on hold at 5.18% effective 1 August 2025 until 1 February 2026. Farmers in tough financial times due to situations outside their control from drought, flood or other natural disasters may be eligible to apply for a RIC loan.

RIC's AgriStarter Loan is also available for new farm businesses or succession planning to keep family farms in the family. Farmers can restructure up to 50% of their existing debt to improve cash flow to gain some financial breathing space. More information Our Loans - Regional Investment Corporation.

Apply for Summer of Cyber Program

Summer of cyber is a government program being delivered in partnership with the Australian Women In Security Network (AWSN).

The program is boosting the cyber capabilities and competitiveness of small and medium-sized businesses and startups across all sectors, including technology.

It aims to bridge the cyber skills gap by connecting businesses with tertiary cyber students and recent graduates to solve cyber-related challenges over 10-12 weeks, at no financial cost to the business.

To participate, businesses will need a cyber-related problem or project that needs solving.

Businesses are also expected to provide in-kind support including:

- Mentoring and guidance to students
- Holding meetings with the project team and being involved in the process
- Providing a desk and equipment for the student (if permitted).

Cheaper Home Batteries Program

The Australian government is offering the cheaper home batteries program, to help more homes tackle bills and reduce emissions.

From 1 July 2025, households and small businesses may be eligible for around a 30% discount on the upfront cost of installing small-scale battery systems alongside new or existing rooftop solar. The discount will be based on the usable capacity of the battery and will gradually decline through to 2030.

While Australia has the highest rate of rooftop solar in the world, just one in 40 households have a battery, meaning they can't store cheap renewable energy for when they need it most.

Under the program, a household could save around:

- \$4,000 off the upfront cost of installing an 11.5 kwh battery previously costing around \$13.000.
- \$700 to \$1,600 per year on their electricity bill, with the battery delivering \$300 to \$900 of that.

Power saving bonus for concession holders

Eligible Victorian households can apply for the <u>power saving bonus</u> through the Victorian Energy Compare (VEC) website, whilst checking they're on the best energy offer.

When applying, eligible households need a recent residential electricity bill and must hold a health care, pensioner concession, veterans' affairs pensioner concession or veterans' affairs gold card.

For those without internet access or for anyone needing extra support accessing the bonus, 250 participating neighbourhood houses across Victoria are delivering in-person support to apply.

All Victorians are encouraged to visit the free and independent <u>VCE website</u> to shop around for a better deal on their energy – last year, users typically saved \$240 per year on their energy bills by switching providers.

Water Efficiency Rebate Program

East Gippsland Water has introduced a new water efficiency rebate program to assist residents and small business save water and costs.

The program helps customers reduce water consumption by providing incentives to save water and will run until 30 June 2028.

The water efficiency rebate program assists eligible customers to maximise their water savings by installing more water efficient products to replace inefficient ones and receive up to a maximum of \$1,500 in rebates for agreed/eligible products, such as **mulch**, **showerheads**, **water tanks and more**.

Heating and cooling discounts

You can reduce costs by replacing old heating and cooling systems with energy-efficient systems through the Victorian Energy Upgrades (VEU) program, helping families slash their energy bills.

The cost of heating this winter could be a significant part of your energy bill. By replacing old heating with a new energy efficient system, you can reduce your costs and energy use.

Trees on Farms Incubator Program

Closes 17 October 2025

The Trees on Farms Incubator Program supports communities of rural landowners to receive in-depth training and planning advice that will help strengthen their technical knowledge and informed decision-making.

The program invites applications from organisations or entities, with the capacity to design and deliver a customised suite of activities that address the practical, technical, and strategic aspects of tree growing - including risks and opportunities of establishing and managing trees on farms.

Under the Incubator Program, you can apply for up to \$50,000 (excl. GST) in grant funding to deliver an incubator project over a period of up to 12-months.

Examples of activities that can be delivered by an Incubator project include:

- Coordination activities: landowner network meetings or on-site visits.
- Education activities: visits to demonstration sites or timber mills and processors, or delivery of tree-growing courses.
- Planning activities: feasibility assessments, financial modelling, development of VToF project plans.

Once they have completed the incubator project, landowners will be supported to develop their own VToF project plan that is implementation-ready and can be used to apply for grant funding under the Victorian Trees on Farms Program.

Council community grants open October

Impact Grants will be released in October 2025. Between \$3,001 and \$20,000 will be available for community development, cultural development, or environmental sustainability initiatives.

There is a dedicated Environment Stream, aligned to support the delivery of Council's Environmental Sustainability Strategy 2022-2032. Eligible projects in this category need to align with one (or more) of the goals of the environment strategy, namely:

- 1. Conservation of the natural environment and biodiversity.
- 2. Sustainable management of natural resources and climate mitigation.
- 3. Community participation in the climate response.
- 4. Respect and alignment with the rights of the Traditional Owner Groups.
- 5. Environmental sustainability supports sustainable economic growth and new job opportunities.
- 6. Growth in the circular economy.
- 7. Community resilience to respond to increasing climate risk and natural disasters.

Applications need to be submitted and acquitted through Smarty Grants, an online grants management program. More information contact communitygrants@egipps.vic.gov.au

Regional Microgrids Program - Australian Renewable Energy Agency (ARENA) to 19 Dec

There is a Federal Government fund of up to \$120M to support regional microgrids which opened on 25/8/2025 and closes 19/12/2025.

They are inviting Expressions of Interest - with a project plan (maximum 20 pages), conflict of interest declaration (see template), and complete the project budget template. Program Guidelines provide further information, and it is requirement to speak with ARENA before submitting an EOI.

How Microgrids Work

- 1. A microgrid generates power at a local level, rather than receiving it from the grid.
- 2. The system ensures that local renewable sources, energy storage, and other resources are coordinated effectively.
- 3. Microgrids can be Grid-Connected or Independent:
- Embedded Microgrid: An electricity supply arrangement that coordinates and optimises the use of connected, locationally proximate distributed energy resources

to provide secure and reliable electricity within the microgrid and can provide value to the major grid. This could include energy market participation, provision of system flexibility, systems services and deferral of network investment.

Standalone Power Systems (SPS): An electricity supply arrangement that can
demonstrate temporary or permanent operation when not physically connected to a
major grid. SAPS encompasses supply to single and multiple customers. Where:
customers, currently connected to a major grid, can move to a SAPS, or a SAPS is
installed rather than a new grid connection.

Benefits

To ensure the best outcomes for your livestock, report any dingo-related incidents to your local **Senior Vertebrate Species Management Officer (SVSMO)** as soon as possible or alternatively, you may contact the **Customer Call Centre** at **136 186** to report dingo predation. SVSMO's response will depend on the number and severity of **Incident Reports (IRs)** currently being handled.

The SVSMO can assist with

- on on-farm management practices to mitigate dingo impacts
- Demonstration of dingo predation management tools and techniques
- Updates on dingo predation management activities on adjacent Public Land

Feral Pig Management

Favourable conditions have resulted in increased feral pig activity in some areas. The VSMP will continue to deliver the Landscape Feral Pig project across eastern Victoria. Control activities removed 73 feral pigs from the landscape in 2024-25, bringing the total to 383 pigs across the life of the project.

New control sites have been identified in Far East Gippsland, as a result of community reporting and historical sightings. Survey, reconnaissance and monitoring are underway to identify key control points.

Reporting feral pig activity either on your property or on the public land estate helps build data on feral pig presence and movement, allowing public land managers to prioritise areas for control works. Having this information also increases the opportunity for funds to be allocated to feral pig management. Please report activity at feral.pigs@deeca.vic.gov.au or phone 136 186.

Water quality testing during drought essential for food safety

Horticulture growers should take appropriate action to ensure that produce impacted by weather events or drought conditions is safe for consumption.

These events can physically damage produce and/or contaminate it with dirt, chemicals or animal faeces carried by wind or water. It is recommended that growers keep records of key weather events that impact their farm, including rainfall records and periods of strong wind.

It is important to note that weather events and sources of contamination may not always occur at the growing site, but rather in the larger catchment area, which can impact water quality.

Where to get water samples tested in Victoria

Use a National Association of Testing Authorities (NATA) accredited laboratory, listed on the <u>NATA webpage</u>. Search the term 'Analysis for microorganisms' fresh waters' and enter your location to find a suitable service.

Sampling costs

As a guide, the average cost of a single sample test is \$50 to \$100 for generic *E.coli*. If submitting multiple samples or testing for additional pathogens (see sampling tips), costs will increase.

Cereal crop density calculator (tiller estimator)

The <u>Crop Plant Density tool</u> is a simple method to calculate key crop metrics from crop observations in the paddock.

The formula remains the same, whether calculating plants or tillers so the opportunity to understand the crop biomass can be identified by entering the tiller counts into the relevant sections.

Knowing plant numbers and the development of tillers can show potential yield and also provide guidance with the <u>hay versus grain calculation</u>.

Agriculture Sector Advisory Committee - ASAC

The East Gippsland Agricultural Sector Advisory Committee (ASAC) met on 20 August 2025 and discussed a range of critical issues impacting the region's agricultural communities and industries.

The meeting marked the first for the newly appointed ASAC cohort, which includes seven new individual members and a new industry body representative, the Gippsland Agricultural Group. Each member had the opportunity to share their background and interest in the agricultural sector, setting the stage for a collaborative and informed term ahead.

Key agenda items included the economic implications of offshore renewable energy projects in the Gippsland region and a review of the ASAC's recent performance and structure. A recent visit to the region by Tom McIntosh MP sparked a broader conversation around drought preparedness, mental health in rural communities, and the importance of early decision-making for resilience.

Committee members also raised growing concerns about pest animal management, highlighting the need for coordinated advocacy and action.

The following recommendations were formally provided to Council:

- 1. Circulate the advocacy priority: ensuring the long-term viability of Victoria's largest commercial fishing fleet amid offshore wind development.
- 2. Coordinate the formation of an ASAC Planning and Development Subgroup and arrange a meeting with Council's planning team.
- 3. Provide an update to ASAC on next steps following the Councillor briefing on the Rural Land Use Strategy.
- 4. Consider observer representation on the Gippsland Critical Mineral Mine Community Reference Group.

5. Coordinate stakeholders to develop an advocacy strategy on pest animal management and include this as an agenda item for the next meeting.

Applying for a single farm enterprise exemption

If you own more than one farm property you may be eligible for an exemption from the Municipal Charge, the Waste Levy, and the fixed amount of the ESVF on some of the properties.

Where more than one farm property is used to operate a single farm enterprise, a person may only need to pay the Municipal Charge and the fixed charge of the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) once, by applying for a single farm enterprise exemption.

The ESVF fixed charge must be paid on at least one property which forms part of the single farm enterprise (the properties do not need to be in the same council municipality). The fixed charge must be applied to all properties with an occupied dwelling.

The Municipal Charge must be paid on at least one property within the single farm enterprise in each council municipality. The Municipal Charge must be applied to all properties with a dwelling.

Watch out for Khaki Weed

Khaki Weed (*Alternanthera pungens*) is a target species for the East Gippsland area, with very low populations occurring within our boundaries. It is a creeping perennial that runs along the ground, with small fluffy pale green flowers, spiny seeds and oval slightly hairy leaves. This species can grow from fragments and seeds, which are viable for an extended time in the soil. Germination can occur from August onwards with flowering and seeding commencing in Spring. Management measures recommended are application



commencing in Spring. Management measures recommended are application of a registered herbicide, cultivation and physical removal.

Regional Renewables Farm Forum and Tour 9-11 September

The Gippsland New Energy Conference was a powerful showcase of regional leadership in renewables, drawing over 700 attendees across three dynamic days. The event featured Councils coordinated Regional Renewables Farm Forum and Tour, with around 110 participants engaging in discussions focused on the future of renewables in agriculture and community collaboration.



The farm focus presented a mix of policy, innovation, and on-farm application to highlight how Gippsland is leading in renewables and circular economy thinking

Key themes included the shift from social licence to social performance, highlighting how companies must actively demonstrate value and build trust with communities to successfully deliver renewable projects. Attendees explored Victoria's energy transition plans and heard

how VICGRID is working to connect with regional communities. A strong focus was placed on how industry can bring farmers along on the journey—building capacity, sharing benefits, and fostering innovation. A highlight was hearing directly from farmers who shared the benefits of wind turbine installations, and local innovator Sandra Jefford showcased the savings achieved through on-farm renewable technologies.





The farm tour organised by Council's Economic
Development team with the assistance of Wellington Shire
Council and DEECA staff, had 21 participants from
universities, Food and Fibre Gippsland, media, government,

industry, and the community. Three farmers showcased how technology and renewables are being used to reduce input costs, increase

productivity, and streamline operations. The fourth site, Elecsome, impressed attendees with its pioneering work in solar panel recycling—reclaiming trace elements and repurposing glass into road materials, a promising step toward circular economy solutions.





Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with one Melbournian attendee remarking, "Gippslanders are innovators and risk takers, willing to invest in their future." The event not only informed but inspired attendees, reinforcing Gippsland's role as a leader in renewable energy and agricultural innovation.


